BEST objective

Building awareness of biomass as Africa's main source of primary energy and its relevance to poverty alleviation, especially among decision-makers at policy level

by

Supporting African governments to develop national biomass energy strategies that set out rational and implementable approaches to manage the biomass energy sector.



BEST rationale

- 2.7 billion people (40% of world population) rely on traditional use of biomass for cooking
- Due to o.a. population growth, this number is expected to *rise* over the coming decades (World Energy Outlook 2010)
- Indoor air pollution and related health issues
- Misconceptions
 - Biomass as backward fuel
 - Contribution of biomass to deforestation



BEST measures

- Improve sustainability of supply
- Raise end-user efficiency
- Promote alternative sources of energy where appropriate
- Address negative perceptions of biomass energy



BEST method

- Developing a concensus around a biomass energy strategy in a participatory manner
- Including government, private sector and civil society
- Special attention to the inclusion of women, given their key roles in the biomass supply and demand system
- High level of flexibility; project design depends on national and local circumstances



BEST method

- Technical assistance to governments to identify key challenges and develop scenarios
- Support to team building and national stakeholder dialogues
- Technical assistance to design biomass energy strategies and action plans
- (Regional workshops to exchange experiences)



BEST experience

- Biomass energy is associated with underdevelopment and environmental degradation and is given low priority
- Biomass fuels tend to be cheap, managed in the informal sector and investments are generally unatractive to large capital
- Large sections of the biomass energy sector operate outside the law



BEST experience

- The scattered sector is hardly caught in facts and figures
- The illegal and scattered nature of the biomass energy sector inhibits the uptake of modern systems of production and consumption
- There is a shortage of well-qualified personnel to support sector development



BEST conditions for success

- Revealing links between process and primary reference frameworks; international, regional, national
- Incorporating the role of women and formulate recommendations for concrete actions
- Encourage, maintain and support compliance by implementing a communication strategy
- Attention for capacity development



BEST conditions for success

- (get to) know the market; supply- and demand side in all their variety
- Inclusion of research- and training institutes
- Define risks and design a flexible process from the beginning
- Realistic assumptions on actor capacities and conditions
- Trust among project partners and clear rules and responsibilities



- Request for assistance from governmental body to EUEI PDF
- Problem definition by government (when desired with assistance from EUEI PDF)
- Design of Terms of Reference in cooperation with EUEI PDF
- Tender procedure according to relevant procurement regulations to find a suitable contractor
